### DESCRIPCION DEL LIBRO MOKSHA

Moksha, also spelled mokṣa, also called mukti, in Indian philosophy and religion, liberation from the cycle of death and rebirth (samsara). Derived from the Sanskrit word muc (‘to free’), the term moksha literally means freedom from samsara. Moksha.
